1:45 pm      Preservation of Internet Materials Citations in Judicial Opinions  
*Kathryn L. Loomis, Reporter of Decisions, Michigan Supreme Court*

As the Internet has become a greater part of our daily lives, courts have increasingly needed to use and refer to Internet sites and materials in opinions. But unlike books that are archived in libraries, Internet sources are often short-lived. Should courts preserve information from the Internet when it is cited in an opinion? What information from the Internet can be preserved? Are there guidelines to assist judges in making the determination of what information to preserve? How can courts ensure that the information that was viewed and relied upon by a judge will be the same information seen by subsequent visitors to that Internet site? Learn about how courts around the country are approaching these issues.

Technology-Aided Access to Courts through Enhanced Online  
Functionality

Judicial systems exist to provide a way for societies to organize themselves around the rule of law. In order to accomplish this goal, courts need to be (1) accessible; (2) fair; and (3) cost-effective. American courts can be difficult to understand and use, especially for people without attorneys. An technology-driven approach to public interaction with courts has the potential to improve accessibility and make courts better suited to the information age.
